Pastoral Reflection

Reign of Christ Sunday is the "New Year's Eve" Sunday of the Christian calendar. Since the first Sunday of Advent in 2019, we have journeyed through a most unusual, and certainly unanticipated year. We have known death of beloved family and friends and witnessed the horror of



continued needless deaths of persons of color alongside a pandemic death toll that reaches toward a quarter million people just in the United States. We have experienced the upheaval and anxiety of state and local shut-downs. We have curtailed travel and daily errands and remained at home for work and school. We have learned to wear masks as acts of compassion. We have lived through a contentious election cycle. We have struggled with depression, other physical maladies, and loneliness. We have endured.

The texts today turn this Christian New Year's Eve on its side, however. Rather than entreating us to ignore the systems of injustice in our community and world that led to protests and dissent, they call us to hear the cries of pain, frustration, and anguish that led people to stop suffering in silence and take to the streets – and become part of the healing. While COVID19 necessitates we maintain physical distance and smile behind masks while separated from loved ones, today's texts remind us that the pandemic does not stop our reaching out to one another, checking in, creatively – even playfully – being thoughtful, and helping each other through this strange pilgrimage as we grieve and hope together. And though the future remains uncertain in its outcome and we will never be who we were before 2020 came our way, what this year and today's texts offer us is the challenge to emerge from this experience *better* than we were...more thankful...more generous...more welcoming... more merciful...more patient...more kind...more flexible...and more compassionate than we ever thought to be. As we wrestle with how to give thanks to God for a year that has not been easy, we do so at a distance from one another and yet in community. And what this year has to teach us as we continue to move forward together as the hands and feet, heart and mind, eyes and voice of Christ in the world may just transform us yet...and be a blessing far beyond our imagining upon this old world of ours. May it be so. –Pastor Holly

A Williamsburg, Virginia, native, Henry Smith (1952) wrote "Give Thanks" in 1978 shortly after graduating from college. It is the only one of over 300 compositions he has had published. Give me the eye that is willing to see that thou hast not left thyself without a witness in every living thing....Give me the listening ear, the eye that is willing to see."³

Enter into prayer trusting that God who fashioned you hears and sees the longings and needs of your heart.

Again, help *all of us* seek and be ready for the transformation that needs to come for justice and peace to reign in the hearts and systems we create *… Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer …*

We continue to offer prayers that the stain of racism that exists on the fabric of our nation and and the tendencies toward discrimination and dehumanization in our world would be eradicated. Give us the strength to overcome these sins ... *Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer* ...

The Reverend Fred Pratt Green (1903-2000) was a British Methodist pastor throughout England. However, it wasn't until his retirement that he became a prolific and very popular hymnist. Writing over 300 hymns, Green was attributed the leader of the hymn writing "explosion" of the 1960s, and more of his hymns appear in North American hymnals today than any other 20th century hymn writer. This harvest hymn set to a Welsh melody intertwines God's care for our physical world and needs with our spiritual nurture and sustenance in verses 1 $c^{\infty} 2$ while verse 3 reminds us we are the hands and feet of Christ and must embody this care and justice through our actions and words each day.⁴ Sing or read the text or sing along with the Good Shepherd Lutheran Church of Monroeville, Pennsylvania's choir at https://youtu.be/AusLKhwtiE4.
