This week, the lectionary turns us to Psalm 31, a psalm many folk in our congregation have mentioned offers particular comfort during this time of living within the COVID19 pandemic. Today, we join Christians around the world who hold this psalm's words in prayer and worship wherever they are, however they are.

The second verse of the following hymn traditionally starts, "Here I raise mine Ebenezer, hither by thy help I've come." The Ebenezer stone, a "Stone of Help" was a large boulder stood on end as a signal, or standing stone to God.

#### Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing

The English dissenting Baptist, Rev. Robert Robinson (1735-1790), wrote this beloved hymn. It reminds us of the ancient practice of raising stones to mark our trust in God's providence and care to see us safely home. Come, thou Fount of every blessing, tune my heart to sing thy grace; streams of mercy, never ceasing, call for songs of loudest praise. Teach me some melodious sonnet, sung by flaming tongues above. Praise the mount I'm fixed upon it mount of God's redeeming love.

Here I raise *to thee an altar*;<sup>2</sup> hither by thy help I've come; and I hope, by thy good pleasure, safely to arrive at home. Jesus sought me when a stranger, wandering from the fold of God; he, to rescue me from danger, bought me with his precious blood.

Oh, to grace how great a debtor daily I'm constrained to be! Let thy goodness, like a fetter, bind my wandering heart to thee: prone to wander, Lord, I feel it, prone to leave the God I love; here's my heart, O take and seal it; seal it for thy courts above.

## God, My Rock and Refuge...

Dun Carloway Broch is one of over 500 stone fortresses scattered around Scotland and is estimated to have been built about 2300 years ago on the western side of the Outer Hebredian Isle of Lewis. Such fortresses were both storehouses and places of refuge during attacks or siege. High on hills or cliffs, brochs were more easily defensible. This broch was in active use for over 1000 years and then used as a storehouse until the 1500s.

- A fortress was a place to which to flee in extreme crises and protection from dire threats. How do I claim God as my Fortress, my Broch now?
- The broch was also a place of refuge, a storehouse for ample supplies and cisterns of fresh water, and a location that offered long views in all directions. As I shelter-at-home, for what resources and relationships am I thankful? What new perspective is COVID19 offering me of God's provision?

#### We Hold in Prayer...

Many of this week's prayers are requests from members of our congregation in the past week. **If you** *have general or specific prayer requests—joys as well as concerns—to share please contact* Holly or Daryn to pass them along.

As a community of faith gathered in Spirit when we cannot be in person, we offer our hearts and voices in prayer where we are, as we are, entrusting the Spirit's moving among us and responding far beyond our individual reach and influence...

With Barbara, Pastor Daryn, and Pastor Holly we hold persons living with non-COVID19 illness and injury requiring hospitalization or treatment. We speak name of Daryn's Aunt **Lana Bunce** hospitalized in cardiac ICU after suffering a major heart attack on May 3<sup>rd</sup> and hold her to God's healing presence. We hold to Spirit's compassionate safe-keeping Holly's Aunt **Deb Benzenhafer**, in Wartburg, TN, who is diagnosed with aggressive stomach cancer and began chemotherapy this week while awaiting a determination from her medical team as to how to move forward with treatment. We also hold Holly's cousin, **Diana Freels Nease** and her family in Franklin, OH, to God's tender care as she was moved to hospice after many years living with cancer. In the midst of suffering and unknowing, life changes and beloved presence, we gather these souls before you and now speak the names of persons likewise confronting serious medical conditions ...*Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer....* 

With Liz, Barbara, Marilyn, and Pastor Holly, we hold persons living with COVID19 diagnoses, awaiting test results, and hospitalized, especially Liz's **Aunt Virginia**, who tested positive, the residents at **Wingate** who were tested this week after a resident texted positive; Marilyn's folks at **Rivercourt**; Holly's colleague, **Johnny Gall** currently positive and quarantined at home; and Carole Sullivan's brother who has underlying complications. For their recovery, return to the fullness of life...and for souls with COVID19 whose names we speak aloud...*Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer....* 



With Clif, Anthony, Nancy, John, Louise, and Ernie, we celebrate the beauty and gradual warmth of spring: sitting outside and going for walks, enjoying chipmunks, gardening, mini-golfing, and yard work. With Liz, we offer gratitude for animal companions who grant us perspective on what really matters, especially **Rascal** and **Maxwell**. With renewed eyes to see the deep interweaving of our lives with all nature and well-being...*Praise God, from whom all blessings flow....* 

With Pastor Holly, we continue to hold people performing essential work to God's safe-

keeping: truckers and mail delivery, grocery and pharmacy workers, cleaning services, garbage collectors, gas station workers, and security guards such as **Calvin James Munerlyn**, of Flint, MI, who died from gunshot wounding for ensuring people wore masks before entering the store he protected. We hold hospital, hospice, rehab, first responder, counseling, and social work staffs who faithfully continue to work each day to provide healing aid to others at their own personal risk, including **Ben Buckley**, a pathology assistant in Jackson, MS; **Dr. John Merriman**, a medical researcher and nurse in New York City...and for souls engaged in this work whose names we speak aloud...*Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer...* 

With Anthony, Marty, and Pastor Daryn, we give thanks for persons who are moving toward all forms of recovery and restoration of physical and mental health, especially Daryn's cousin **Audrey** who had knee surgery and has progressed through physical therapy successfully, and Anthony's mother in the Philippines who remains stable, and Marty's niece **Linda** who is on her third round of chemotherapy...*Praise God, from whom all blessings flow....* 

With Anne & Sherry, Marty, Barbara, and Marilyn, we continue to hold persons in assisted living communities, especially Wingate and Rivercourt, and souls living at home alone. We especially remember **Bruce Wile** at Wingate; and Barbara's friend and fellow Wingate resident, **Barbara Sabbag**, who is experiencing mental decline exacerbated by isolation. Recognizing the strain of social distancing, the potential for loneliness, boredom, isolation, and disconnection; the frustration, lack of energy, and difficulty to remain positive, we hold them...and souls we hold dear whose names we speak aloud to God's gracious peace...*Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer....* 

With Clif and Anthony, we give thanks for new protective equipment for **Anthony** and for the ongoing efforts to supply adequate volume of PPEs, medical devices, and necessary materials to front-line medical providers, essential workers, transportation workers, manufacturers, and individual volunteers...*Praise God, from whom all blessings flow....* 

With Jim and Pastor Holly, we hold graduating students who are foregoing a season of communal celebrations and ceremonial transition for their years of hard work and determined achievement. Entrusting that the absence of traditional milestone events may be met with loving and creative new forms of honoring their transitions to next phases of life, we celebrate them and offer our thanks for their lives and blessings of presence among us, especially **Erin Buckley, Cait Duncan, Lynn Cooper,** and **Katherine House**. For who they have become and the goodness they are bringing into the world...*Praise God, from whom all blessings flow....* 

With Anne, we hold the millions of people now furloughed or fully unemployed and souls living with uncertainty of employment in the near future, especially **Sherry Wile**...and with souls facing such complex losses and instability whose names we speak aloud...*Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer....* 

With Marty and Pastor Holly, we offer prayers for souls in military service, especially Marty's grandson Adam serving in the Army at Fort Hood and Holly's friend Brigadier General, Clint Walker, Commander of the Mississippi National Guard....and for souls in service we know personally whose names we speak aloud...*Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer...* 

With Marilyn, Nancy, and Ernie, we offer gratitude for the guidance and comfort of scripture and devotional materials that enable us to center and hold Christ's teachings and the moving of the Holy Spirit within our lives, especially 2 Peter, *Guideposts*, and our weekly Worship Resource... *Praise God, from whom all blessings flow....* 

With Louise, John, Stan, Andrew, Marty, Anne, and Barbara, we give thanks for family, friends, and neighbors who bring groceries, check in, find ways to visit and check-in, and celebrate birthdays and anniversaries in creative ways...*Praise God, from whom all blessings flow....* 

With Anne and Stan, we hold pastors and their families and all members of clergy, chaplaincy, and faith community leadership who work to hold sacred space and offer presence to others while also being impacted by the societal shifts due to COVID19. We honor the weight of decisions and preparations they are making daily to provide ministerial service, pastoral care, and continued worship in makeshift, less-than-ideal settings. We pray for clergy officiating funerals and weddings through online means, praying over phones with patients whose hands they cannot hold, and managing the multitude of details of daily congregational life that have not let up and are often now more complicated...and for souls in ministry whose names we speak aloud... *Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer...* 

With Marty, we hold our elected local, county, state, and national leaders in prayer for wisdom, compassionate discernment, humane vision, and intentional care in the decisions they are faced with each day during COVID19...*Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer*....

With Andrew, John, and Stan, we anticipate new life in all its forms, especially with Andrew as he awaits the immanent birth of **Wren**'s daughter. So too, we anticipate and hold in Holy Light John's two daughters-in-law (due in July and September) and Stan's daughter (due in August)...*Praise God, from whom all blessings flow....* 

With Jim, Andrew, Clif, Anthony, and Marty we hold Clif's nephew **David** and his family as they mourn the death of his father-in-law, **Richard Rogan**, in Norwood, MA, from COVID19. We hold Andrew's daughter, Wren, in deep condolence in the death of her Aunt **Carolee Zumwalt Light** on April 30. We also lift up the family, friends, and AA members who grieve the death of **Clayton Hewitt** and the many souls in assisted living facilities who have died from COVID19 and its complications. ## God, My Rock and Refuge...

St. Martin's Cross is a high cross—in a way a Christian version of the Ebenezer standing stone that stands outside the entrance of the Abbey on the Holy Isle of Iona, Scotland. Standing 16 feet tall, it was carved from a single slab of red granite in the 8<sup>th</sup> century C.E. It is highly ornate on both sides the side in the photo is covered in spheres and Celtic knotwork, and the reverse has animals and human forms. At one time, Iona, an ancient burial island, had over 300 such high crosses. Three remain standing. However, though the crosses have fallen or been lost to time, the island remains a place of sacred pilgrimage.

Verses 15-16 of Psalm 31 speak to utter trust in God's care and safe-keeping in the face of danger, threat, and dire circumstance. Such trust is also called upon when faced with the ongoing, daily changes we each experience.

- *Am I willing to trust God as my life continues to change—when I don't know and cannot determine what is going to happen, or when I fear what I cherish will be or is being lost to me?*
- This cross has stood for at least 1200 years bearing witness to Christ's presence. How may I live my life this week as an enduring witness to Christ's abiding presence, peace, and hope?

#### Hymn 546

#### **Built on the Rock**

#### KIRKEN DEN ER ET

Written by Danish hymnist Nicolai F.S. Grundtvig (1783-1872), this hymn tune may not be as familiar to Baptists as it is to Lutheran and Dutch Reform traditions, however, its words speak to the reality that though we call on God as our Rock and Refuge, God indwells in us as the "living stones" of the Church. Read the text aloud, or sing with the acapella version online sung by Elliot Bowman at: <u>https://youtu.be/7bKYNIKx7V8</u><sup>5</sup>. Note the fourth verse online is different from what is printed here (there were nine verses originally).

Built on the Rock, the church shall stand even when steeples are falling; Christ builds His church in ev'ry land; bells still are chiming and calling, calling the young and old to rest, calling the souls of those distressed, longing for life everlasting.

Not in a temple made with hands God the Almighty is dwelling; high in the heav'ns His temple stands, all earthly temples excelling. Yet He who dwells in heaven above chooses to live with us in love, making our body His temple. We are God's house of living stones, built for His own habitation; He fills our hearts, His humble thrones, granting us life and salvation. Yet to the place, an earthly frame, we come with thanks to praise His name; God grants His people true blessing.

Thro' all the passing years, O Lord, grant that, when church bells are ringing, many may come to hear God's Word where He the promise is bringing: "I know My own, My own know Me, you, not the world, My face shall see; My peace I leave with you. Amen."

One: Let us greet one another in peace as we prepare for the journey ahead.


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## Announcements
