Lighting the Candle of Life

You may wish to light a candle or use the candle photo as a focus.

ALL: We light the Candle of Life — a candle that represents community, spirit, and the fullness of all of life — birth and death and all of the transitions in between and beyond.



Living in Perspective...

Ascension Sunday hallmarks the day in Eastertide when we observe Jesus' taking leave of his followers in a mystical cloud. Significantly, in Acts, he promises the coming of the Holy Spirit which will enable them to bear witness to his life and teachings...but not yet. For now, they are to experience his absence and live in expectant hope.

- The disciples will pose a question of deep importance and longing for them, and Jesus will not give them a definitive answer. For what do I long and deeply desire today?
- Regarding the larger view of the global impact of the COVID19 pandemic, we are living in a season of pauses and reflection amidst the chaotic change. What am I learning about the world? My community? Myself?
- What is important now? What matters less?

The prolific Methodist hymnist—he wrote over 6500 hymns— Charles Wesley (1707-1788) wrote this hymn for Ascension Sunday and published it with his brother, John, in 1739. Originally with 10 verses, it has been significantly altered over the years, and the "Alleluias" added a century after Wesley put it to print. Speak or sing these words as you enter into worship, or sing along with the congregation of Mt. Olivet Church, Arlington, VA, online here: https://youtu.be/zNJbUBGZfE 1.

Hail the day that sees him rise, Alleluia! to his throne beyond the skies. Alleluia! Christ, the Lamb for sinners given, Alleluia! enters now the highest heaven. Alleluia!

There for him high triumph waits; Alleluia! lift your heads, eternal gates. Alleluia! He has conquered death and sin; Alleluia! take the King of glory in. Alleluia!

Highest heaven its Lord receives; Alleluia! yet he loves the earth he leaves. Alleluia!

Though returning to his throne, Alleluia! still he calls us all his own. Alleluia!

See! He lifts his hands above! Alleluia! See! He shows the prints of love! Alleluia! Hark! His gracious lips bestow, Alleluia! blessings on his church below. Alleluia!

There we shall with you remain, Alleluia! partners of your endless reign, Alleluia! see you with unclouded view, Alleluia! find our heaven of heavens in you. Alleluia!

A Reading from Acts 1:6-14 (NRSV)

Read the text aloud. Pause and notice what image or phrase stands out or "shimmers" as you tell the story.

So when they had come together, they asked him, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?"

He replied, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight.



While he was going and they were gazing up toward heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. They said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into

heaven." Then they returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet, which is near Jerusalem, a Sabbath day's journey away. When they had entered the city, they went to the room upstairs where they were staying, Peter, and John, and James, and Andrew, Philip and Thomas, Bartholomew and Matthew, James son of Alphaeus, and Simon the Zealot, and Judas son of James. All these were constantly devoting themselves to prayer, together with certain women, including Mary the mother of Jesus, as well as his brothers.

ALL: The word of our Lord. Thanks be to God.

Living in Waiting ...

Acts notes that despite all they have experienced with Jesus, his teachings, and his death and resurrection, the disciples still hold onto the hope that their people, Israel, will be restored as an earthly kingdom. Some part within them still looks for Jesus to be a political revolutionary who upends the systems of power and oppression, and takes control of their present circumstances. Instead, Jesus speaks to them of a distinction between human time and God's Time. And then, he is gone.

- Jesus calls us to wait on God and the moving of the Holy Spirit. How do I embody this waiting? How am I resistant to it?
- Just as Jesus indicates the disciples must wait longer, he also directs them that they will be empowered to bear witness to the ends of the earth. This time between his leaving and the Spirit's arrival grants them time to spiritually prepare for a new way of being in the world—a way that, for many of them, will be harsh and fatal. How may I live in this season of Eastertide and COVID19 in such a way as to spiritually prepare myself for a new way of being in the world—a way that may be harsh but still requires and needs my compassion and love as part of the Body of Christ?
- As Jesus tells the disciples to wait, once he is gone, the angels tell them not to dawdle there but to be on their way. As I live into waiting physically in place and spiritually upon God, how may I do so in a way that honors the sacredness of each day and night and the everyday routines that comprise most of life? What is my prayer for my everyday living?

We Hold in Prayer...

Many of this week's prayers are requests from members of our congregation in the past week. **If you** have general or specific prayer requests—joys as well as concerns—to share please contact Holly or Daryn to pass them along.

As a community of faith gathered in Spirit when we cannot be in person, we offer our hearts and voices in prayer where we are, as we are, entrusting the Spirit's moving among us and responding far beyond our individual reach and influence...

We enter prayer today with Jim, Clif, Harry, and Pastor Holly holding in prayer the souls who have entered God's nearer presence. With Jim, we hold his mother's step-son, Larry Brown and his family as they grieve the death of Larry's wife to COVID19. We continue to surround Jim's mother in prayer for God's tender mercies as she lives isolated from networks of loving support within the grief of her husband, Johnny Brown's, death in April. We hold the family of Clif and Harry's friend, Madeline Buttrick, who died from COVID19, to Spirit's consolation and give thanks for her life fully lived. We continue to hold Clif's nephew and his wife as they live within the grief of her father's death. We lift the family of Harry's friend, Audrey Ross, who also died of COVID19, to God's deep peace within their sorrow.

We also keep the families and friends of Holly's former BU student, **Cassie Helms**, a school teacher, who died from gall bladder cancer in Birmingham, AL; and of her Iona Community friend, **Fiona Churcher**, a guitar maker, who died from cancer in London, England. For the lives lost to COVID19 and its impactful trauma, all persons who have entered God's nearer presence since last we entered prayer together, souls who grieve this day... and for souls whose names we speak aloud...*Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer...*.

With Barbara, Ann, Bev, and Pastor Daryn, we lift to God's healing presence persons continuing to be diagnosed and living with COVID19. We especially name **Bruce Wile** and the residents at Wingate who have tested positive, and hold **Ann** and **Sherry** in their concern as they must be present to Bruce from afar. We also hold Daryn's friend, **Frank Dawkins**, living with COVID19, and increase our awareness to the millions of people who have suffered this illness around our world and who will succumb to it in the weeks and months ahead. For their resilience and God's watch-care...and for souls we now name to living with the virus...*Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer...*.

With Ernie, Liz, and Pastor Holly, we hold persons living with non-COVID19 illness and injury requiring hospitalization or treatment. We hold Jonathan Steeve's mother-in-law, **Cindy Chambers**, to Spirit's keeping as she is critically ill with ovarian cancer. We continue to hold Liz's

Aunt **Virginia** who has developed an infection in her throat that impedes her swallowing and recovery. We pray for Holly's Aunt **Deb Benzenhafer**, in Wartburg, TN, as she prepares for stomach cancer surgery in June, and her Uncle **Tom Benzenhafer**, who is recovering at home from knee replacement surgery. In the midst of suffering and unknowing, life changes and beloved presence, we gather these souls before you, Holy Spirit, and now speak the names of persons likewise confronting serious medical conditions...*Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer....*

With Harry and Pastor Holly, we lift persons working across the spectrum of medical services and health care, especially Harry's grandson, **Dr. Ryan Chin**, a doctor in the Bronx and Holly's friend, **Dr. John Merriman**, a nurse in New York City. For them and countless other physicians, nurses, and technicians who specialized in other medical areas but now are managing COVID19 patients; for the over-arching emotional and traumatic toll their dedicated service is exacting; and for their own need for rest, respite, and spaces to grieve in the face of suffering and death...and for souls in medical fields whose names we speak aloud...*Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer...*.

With Ernie, Stan, and Barbara, we offer gratitude for the spiritual sustenance of music and song and the particular beauty of the human voice. We cherish the blessings of scripture and the Worship Resource to connect us to God's presence and our human faith community each week. For these gifts and the goodness of spiritual practices to bear us through all life ... *Praise God, from whom all blessings flow....*

With Ann and Harry, we offer gratitude for food delivery services and food banks providing assistance to seniors, home-bound persons, and people living with food scarcity. We give



particular thanks for the Needham Senior Center, Needham Community Council, and FBC Jamaica Plain as well as family, neighbors, and friends who continue to offer care and help...and for souls receiving assistance and souls engaged in this work whose names we speak aloud...*Praise God, from* whom all blessings flow....

With Harry and Pastor Holly, we lift up students and teachers as they continue to maintain educational pursuits in make-shift and haphazard conditions. As they move to the end of the school year, prepare for exams and final projects, and work to wrap up a most unusual semester, we ask for Holy Spirit's guidance, ability to focus, and good-humored stamina. We especially remember Harry's **grandchildren**, and Holly's teaching colleagues **Bethaney Duncan** and **Arturo Bagley...**and souls in education we name aloud...*Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer...*.

With Stan, we hold to God our concerns for our communities, state, and country as people slip into patterns of dehumanizing disregard, anger, aggression, violence, and deadly force in their frustration over the restraints necessary for the good of the whole. We pray for the safety of customer- and public-facing workers who are encountering ill-treatment, threats, and endangerment for doing their jobs to serve the public. We pray for the individuals at risk of turning to rage and violence and ask for Spirit's intervention. We ask for Holy strands of kindness, compassion, patience, and dignifying respect to weave through the lives and hearts of persons that we may encounter one another as children of God...Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer....

With Anthony, Clif, and Barbara, we delight in creative endeavors that brighten each day and offer goodness and hope in the world, especially art, coloring, cooking, and Zoom yoga...*Praise God, from whom all blessings flow....*

With Louise, Liz, Clif, Stan, and Ernie, we celebrate the beauty of nature and the ability to be outside gardening, walking in nature, getting exercise through cycling, and enjoying flowers in the yard. For the continuity of creation's bounty and promise in the turning through spring toward summer...*Praise God, from whom all blessings flow....*

With Stan and John, we acknowledge the safety and privilege that being able to shelter in the relative comfort of a home, have food available, and being retired or having ongoing jobs affords some of us. With gratitude for each way in which our lives are stable in this chaotic time, we pray for souls who do not have these benefits and privileges and whose income is inconsistent or depleted. We bear witness to the hard discernment our sisters and brothers face in determining whether or not they can afford to shelter at home or risk returning to work. For their safekeeping, ease from worry and fear, job security, insurance, shelter, and access to all needed services...for souls walking the tenuous lines between a stable daily life and one of devastating circumstances who we now name...*Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer...*.

With Ernie and Stan, we hold ministers, musicians, and church staff as they continue to daily discern how to best adapt to an ever-changing reality, expectations, restrictions, and safety concerns for their congregations. For the countless hours of unseen work, planning, strategizing, prayer, and ongoing weekly schedules that they devote in the pastoral care and ministry to and with their communities of faith, and for their continued health, ability to rest, and claim of God's hope and compassion in the world...and for souls in ministry, music, and religious work whose names we speak aloud...*Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer...*.

With John and Harry, we cherish time with family, going on walks together, enjoying children and grandchildren... *Praise God, from whom all blessings flow....*

With John and Stan, we anticipate new life in all its forms, especially John's two daughters-in-law (**Liza** due in July and **Liz** having twins in September) and Stan's daughter **Christie** (due in August)...**Praise God, from whom all blessings flow...**.

For the prayers of our hearts that you, Holy One, know even when words cannot hold them... *Hear my prayer, O Lord....*

Living in Prayer...



The book of Acts notes an interesting point after Jesus' ascension into heaven. Once the angels direct the disciples to leave Mt. Olivet, they return to Jerusalem to the upstairs room where the larger group of followers are sheltering and devote themselves to prayer alongside Jesus' family and the women followers. Often, we read these scriptural accounts as though the events happened in quick succession. In reality, the texts span a great deal of time in some parts and very short spans of time in others. Here, we don't find them receiving Jesus' direction to go to the ends of the earth and bear witness as an immediate imperative. Instead, they return to the upper room—perhaps it was same room where they shared the Last Supper with their Teacher and where Jesus appeared to them after his resurrection—and turn to discerning prayer. They wait on the Spirit to be revealed. They do not act immediately, but instead devote themselves to spiritually preparing for whatever will come.

- What role does prayer have in my life? What, if any, practice of regular prayer do I embody?
- What does it mean for me to be part of a praying community?
- Turn to the Prayers of the People and select one paragraph of prayer. How may I devote myself to prayer and discerning reflection upon these themes each day this week?
- Am I able to not only speak to God in prayer but also be still—body, mind, and soul—to receive prayerfully what God seeks to offer me? Am I prepared to receive a response I do not desire or expect? Am I ready to receive a response I long for and then live into it?
