English hymnist and author, John Richards (b. 1939), has served as a curate in several parishes and as school chaplain and currently is director of Renewal Services. Written in 1978, this hymn focuses on the moving of the Holy Spirit first in creation, then in Christ and his followers, and finally in the church, the Body of Christ, today.² Sing or read aloud the text as an invocation of the Holy Spirit transcending all time and circumstance to move within your life and through your life today—where you are, as you are. Or sing along to three of the verses with handbell musicians, Larry and Carla Sue of Holland, MI, as they play the tune IN BABILONE online: https://youtu.be/HQISm1Iu5nk ³.

Spirit, working in creation, bringing order out of strife: come around God's gathered people, giving harmony and life. Spirit, speaking through the prophets so the voice of God was heard: come, inspire, alert your people to this day's prophetic word.

Spirit, over-shadowing Mary as the Christ-child in her grew: come, so that the Christ within us may today be born anew. Spirit, coming from the Father as a dove upon our Lord: come upon your favored people, and your blessings be outpoured.

Spirit, driving to the desert even God's Anointed One: come to us in trial and testing that God's will in us be done.

Spirit, breathed on the disciples, giving peace where there was fear: come among us, touch us, send us, making Jesus' presence near.

Spirit, wind and flame, empowering fearless witness to the lost: come, unite, renew your wonders as of a new Pentecost!

Praise and glory, Holy Spirit, for your love on us outpoured, giving honor to the Father and proclaiming Jesus "Lord."

A Reading from Acts 2:1-18 (NRSV)

Read the text aloud. Pause and notice what image or phrase stands out or "shimmers" as you tell the story.

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each


of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs-in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?"

But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine."

But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and

all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

Breathe on Me, Breath of God

TRENTHAM

Edwin Hatch (1835-1889) was an English theologian, educator, and minister. This hymn, one of a small body of musical work, has been published in hundreds of hymnals because of its deeply embodied spirituality that calls on an enduring and all-encompassing relationship with the Divine—until God is closer than the pause between each breath.⁴

This prayerful hymn will be our initial Pentecost response to reading aloud and hearing the word of God in worship. Especially in the time of COVID19 when the ability to breathe is so crucial, we turn to the Spirit's lifegiving breath as that which sustains us in scripture, in this life, and in life beyond death. Sing or read it aloud as your prayerful response to the above text, or allow the quartet of voices from St. Mark's United Methodist Church, Houston, TX, wash over you online at https://youtu.be/3qV IHByYBk .5

Breathe on me, Breath of God, fill me with life anew, that I may love the way you love, and do what you would do.

Breathe on me, Breath of God, until my heart is pure,

until my will is one with yours, to do and to endure.

Breathe on me, Breath of God, so shall I never die, but live with you the perfect life for all eternity.

Holy Spirit, Unbounded ...

The Holy Spirit is described in a wide variety of ways: hovering over the primordial waters, as wind and breath, flowing water, an infusing presence that can heal and enliven as well as convict and challenge, as divine Wisdom, the Shekinah, as Sacred Word, a comforter, a dove, a cloud, and as fire, to name a few. This aspect of the Divine, the Holy One, is ineffable Mystery, uncontained and flowing free, but She is also the still, small voice and the abiding presence that does not abandon us from the moment of our first crying breath until the last dying sigh.

- Grappling with the inability to fully describe or contain Holy Spirit, what images do I find most resonate with my experience and understanding of Her? What does each image reveal to me about the Spirit?
- When have I felt the Spirit's presence moving within or even "pouring out" upon me? If I have not, what do I understand or imagine this description to be?
- Peter quotes the prophet Joel to explain to their retractors what is happening. In this time of COVID19, what hope, consolation, and prophetic witness may I offer to a grieving, hurting world this week? To my community and colleagues? My family? My friends and neighbors? The people who provide services for me? The people I do not know who I encounter?

Sweet, Sweet Spirit

words & music by Doris Akers

Doris Akers (1923-1995) was born in Brookfield, MO, one of ten children. She was taught herself piano by age six, and had composed her first song and organized a jazz band by age twelve. Moving among the burgeoning gospel community of the mid-twentieth century, Akers formed the first interracial choir in Los Angeles, the Sky Pilot Choir, in 1958. She wrote over 300 songs and received numerous awards for her music composition, recording, and directing throughout her life. Akers was posthumously inducted into the Gospel Music Hall of Fame in 2001.6

Akers wrote Sweet, Sweet Spirit in 1962 after requiring her choir to wait to enter a Sunday morning worship service because she felt they were not spiritually prepared to lead worship singing. She insisted they wait and pray longer stating, "Prayer is more important than great voices." When the prayers continued, the pastor sent an urgent request that the service start. Gazing at her choir's "sweet expressions" Akers reflected it was a hard to leave even for formal worship — when they felt "a sweet, sweet Spirit in this place." The next morning, she wrote the song that the Smithsonian Institute has named a National Treasure.7 As we celebrate the birth of the Church at Pentecost during COVID19, sing or speak these words with the full assurance that the self-same Spirit of God that settled upon the first Christ-followers, moves within your life, as well. Prayerful Meditation

In a broken and fearful world the Spirit gives us courage to pray without ceasing, to witness among all peoples to Christ as Lord and Savior, to unmask idolatries in church and culture, to hear the voices of peoples long silenced, and to work with others for justice, freedom, and peace. In gratitude to God, empowered by the Spirit, we strive to serve Christ in our daily tasks and to live holy and joyful lives, even as we watch for God's new heaven and new earth, praying, Come, Lord Jesus! With believers in every time and place, we rejoice that nothing in life or in death can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus, our Lord.9

We Hold in Prayer...

Many of this week's prayers are requests from members of our congregation in the past week. **If you have general or specific prayer requests—joys as well as concerns—to share** please contact Holly or Daryn to pass them along.

As a community of faith gathered in Spirit when we cannot be in person, we offer our hearts and voices in prayer where we are, as we are, entrusting the Spirit's moving among us and responding far beyond our individual reach and influence...

This week, in only three months' time, we bear witness to 100,000+ deaths of individuals to COVID19 within our country. We bear witness to the growing number of 355,000+ deaths of individuals who have succumbed to the coronavirus around our world so far. We bear witness to the unreported deaths of individuals to COVID19 who are not counted both in the United States and in countries across the globe. We give witness to their lives, their relationships, friends, and beloved ones. We witness their loss in work and communities. We witness the hollowness of life without their laughter, the absence of their compassion and wisdom, and the emptiness at table and daily routines and presence that impacts us all and leaves us wanting. We pause and seek to empathize with the fullness of trauma and grief for those souls who love and now survive them. For the lives lost to COVID19 and its impactful trauma, and souls now released from their suffering of this pandemic into your Spirit's living breath who we now name... Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer....

We hold **Liz and her family** to God's deep peace as they grieve the death of her **Aunt Virginia**. May these days and weeks ahead be infused with Spirit's healing peace alongside the legacy of Virginia's life and love. With Ernie, we hold the family of **Cindy Chambers** as they grieve her death after a long illness. For these two lives and all persons who have entered God's nearer presence since last we entered prayer together, souls who grieve this day... and for souls whose names we speak aloud...*Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer...*.

Holy Spirit, Living Word...

In today's text, situated at the end of the liturgical season of Eastertide, the Spirit finally makes Her arrival to Jesus' followers. She comes as a *sound* and *fire* and *comprehensible language*. She unlocks the inhibitions and fear-chambers of the Christ-followers and leaves no room for hesitation and no person untouched. Her fire anoints them, as the waters of our baptism anoint us, to a life-long dedication to serving as Christ's Body in the world. No limitation or infirmity, no socially-constructed prejudice or discrimination allows us to waver from our calling through the Spirit's baptism by fire or water to care for the world with great compassion; generous welcome; and deep commitment to serve and put first the least of these, the vulnerable, and the harmed.

- The Holy Spirit enters the story in a manner of some upheaval that enables the Christ-followers to begin to speak in a way that others can now understand them. Consider how language is used to both divide, shut down, and alienate people and also to include, respect, and nurture community. What forms of language have I witnessed recently? In what ways has my language, my conversation, reflected my own baptism by water in the Spirit? When has it not?
- On this week at the beginning of the Season after Pentecost, how may I commit myself to intention, careful speech that offers healing, inclusion, compassion, and hope to each person I encounter? What do I need to change in how I think or talk to ensure I speak in a way that acknowledges the full value and respect for the children of God I encounter?

Who needs to hear a life-giving, affirmative, loving, or fully-supportive word from me this week? Am I willing to trust the Spirit's moving in my own life to speak hope, peace, and love into the places of need, *injustice, pain, and loneliness where I've chosen to be silent?*

Henry Hallum Tweedy (1868-1953) attended Phillips Andover Academy in Andover, MA, before earning degrees at Yale, Union Theological Seminary, and University of Berlin. A Congregationalist minister, he eventually became a homiletics professor at Yale specializing in liturgy, music, and the arts. Tweedy wrote this Pentecost hymn in 1933 in the midst of the Great Depression. Tweedy sought to interpret the coming of the Holy Spirit in Acts in a way that reminds present-day Christians that the Spirit continues to move through each of us regardless of the circumstances or point in history in which we find ourselves. 10

Whatever this moment in life with COVID19, Pentecost calls us to be the living church every day, not only on Sundays or when it's convenient or easy. Sing this English melody or read the words as a prayer of response and commitment to the Spirit's refining fire, wind of wisdom, and enabling language that moves within each of us as we endeavor to be the hands and feet, heart and mind, voice and eyes of Christ in a world in dire need of transformative love, compassionate joy, and unbridled welcome.
