Lighting the Candle of Life

(You may wish to light a candle or use the photo of our Candle of Life as a focus.)

ALL: We light the Candle of Life — a candle that represents community, spirit, and the fullness of all of life — birth and death and all of the transitions in between and beyond.

(As we live into this Eastertide, balancing the risen Christ, spring's burgeoning life, and COVID19's strain and concern, claim these words in hope and promise as written by the prolific New Zealand hymn writer, Shirley Erena Murray (1931-2020). The stone has rolled away and death cannot imprison!
O sing this Easter Day,

for Jesus Christ has risen, has risen, has risen!

Because you live, O Christ, the spirit bird of hope is freed for flying, our cages of despair no longer keep us closed and life denying. (*Refrain*)

Because you live, O Christ, the rainbow of your peace will span creation, The colors of your love will draw all humankind to adoration. (*Refrain*)

A Reading from John 20: 19-31

(Read the text aloud. Pause and notice what image or phrase stands out or "shimmers" as you tell the story.) When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the religious leaders, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands." Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!"

Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

Time of Reflection

(Choose one or more of the following notes to reflect upon the scripture text. Perhaps write your thoughts, call a friend or family member to discuss it, or allow the story to seep into your imagination.)

- What image, word, or phrase stood out or "shimmered" to me? Reflect on its significance today. Consider holding the image or phrase as a focus of prayer this week.
- Imagine hiding in the locked room with the other disciples afraid to leave or be seen. Then, Jesus appears saying "Peace be with you." As people are isolated today, locked away in caution and fear, what from what am I hiding? What in my life have I "locked away"? How may I accept Christ's presence there? Am I able to rest within Christ's peace?
- Notice how physical Jesus is. He's doing all the things we cannot in COVID19—standing in a crowded room, speaking, breathing on them, touching them, having them touch his wounds. What do I long for about being present with other people? How may I reach out and touch someone in compassion, forgiveness, loving presence, or inclusion this week?
- What might the "other signs" be that Jesus enacted with his disciples? What would I have wanted or needed to see or experience to truly commit myself to a life as a Christ-follower? What do I seek from Christ in my life, community, and world this week?


