Scriptures for this Week

Choose as many of these scriptures to accompany you throughout the week as you would like. You may choose to read one a day, or focus on one for the entire week. What stands out as you read them? What word or idea "shimmers" for you? Are there themes or ideas of connection between the scriptures, or that speak to particular circumstances you are experiencing? Where do you find good news in these passages?

Do the scriptures this week leave you with any questions? God's salvific action in delivering the Israelites from the oppressive hands of the Egyptians has been both the catalyst for liberation theology and for deep questioning about the justice and mercy of God - what in theological circles is called theodicy - particularly in light of the Christian tradition's emphasis on forgiveness and grace. We can see places throughout our scriptures where one is emphasized over another - retribution vs. grace and forgiveness. Is there room for both when it comes to God's justice? Are there choices to be made? What does Jesus have to say about these things? What does Jesus's lived testimony have to teach us about these things?

May these promptings of faith be a blessing as you deeply consider some of the most challenging and rich questions of our faith.

All Shall Be Well: Reflections on Julian of Norwich



I have been thinking a lot about Julian of Norwich lately—and not just because the 14th century mystic's feast day is upon us (May 8). I can't help thinking that she has particular wisdom for us in the time in which we find ourselves.

Julian—whose book is thought to be the oldest surviving book written by a woman in English—wrote during a period of great suffering and uncertainty. The 100 Years War between England and France began before she was born and continued long after she died. As often accompanies war, famine was prevalent throughout England. Perhaps most catastrophic of all, she wrote during a time of pandemic: the decimation of much of Europe's population by the bubonic plague. Three outbreaks occurred in her city throughout her life, and she herself nearly died, from plague or some other ravaging disease. All in all, the pain must have seemed overwhelming: suffering was everywhere. Many in her day attributed the horror to the wrath of God. Perhaps it is surprising, then, that her theological response is not one of despair or judgment, but of love, solidarity, and hope.

She is well known as the author of the prayer, "all shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well." In images she is often depicted with a cat or a hazelnut. She lived as an anchoress, completely isolated in a one room cell off the side of a church. This is not to say she wouldn't have had interactions with the urban environment around her, but all such interactions would have taken place through the walls and windows of her anchorage. Sound at all familiar?

Julian lived in isolation during a pandemic.

When she was struck down with illness she experienced a number of visions, which have been passed down to us as The Revelations of Divine Love" or the Showings. In a seemingly paradoxical move, one who lived in isolation passed down to us an understanding of a God who is in essence relational: the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit in relationship with one another and with humanity through the solidarity of the person of Jesus.

Indeed, Julian uses highly relational language to describe God and Jesus and their relationship to humanity: mother, father, brother, and spouse. God, in this sense, is imminent and connected. This highly relational God has created a world in which everything that exists, exists through the love of God's-self. God makes, loves, and protects, and thus the relational love and action of God permeate all of life.

You may have heard the story about the hazelnut. Julian describe one of her visions,

"And in this he showed me a little thing, the quantity of a hazel nut, lying in the palm of my hand, as it seemed. And it was as round as any ball. I looked upon it with the eye of my understanding, and thought, "what may this be?' And it was answered generally thus, 'It is all that is made.' I marveled how it might last, for I thought it might suddenly have fallen to nothing for littleness. And I was

answered in my understanding: It lasts and ever shall, for God loves it. And so have all things their beginning by the love of God.

"In this little thing I saw three properties. The first is that God made it. The second that God loves in. And the third, that God keeps it."

Julian looked at the suffering around her and saw not the punishment of God, but the love of God extending into every nook and cranny to meet and find us in it. And nothing demonstrated this more for her than the example of Jesus himself—just as we suffer, so did Jesus. God does not stay above the fray, so to speak, but enters into our suffering in solidarity.

So when Julian says, "all shall be well and all shall be well and all manner of things shall be well" it is not the Hallmark-card statement of someone putting on rose-colored glasses, or sticking their head in the sand pretending all this bad stuff will go away, but the voice of one who has deeply experienced suffering and tried to make sense of it. And the way she does so is through a brutally honest trust in the love of God.

It strikes me that this is a prayer we can lean into even when we don't see it or feel it. It is a not a descriptive statement of *now*, but a hopeful statement of what *shall be*. It is, in many ways, an Easter declaration: there will be life. Wholeness. Peace. Restoration. All shall be well.

We know now that our lives may never fully return to the way they were before the pandemic. Just as 9-11 forever changed the way we navigated and experienced airports, this pandemic will alter the way we do church. We may not be able to gather as a full community again for a good long time, and we likely won't be able to sing together for even longer. There is much to grieve, for there is much lost.

And yet, how we do church is not the church—we are. And we will navigate these uncharted waters as so many of the saints have done before us, leaning into the wind of the Spirit as she carries us forward into whatever is next. For as Julian reminds us in the image of the hazelnut, that which God has created, "lasts and ever shall, for God loves it. In this little thing I saw three properties. The first is that God made it. The second that God loves in. And the third, that God keeps it."

God keeps us, and God will keep the church, even if and when it looks different than it did before. And "all shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well.
